III. Course Description and Objectives

Course Description

This course is designed to facilitate knowledge of international politics to students. Students are introduced key concepts and theoretical perspectives in international relations as well as main themes that shape interaction between countries such as power politics, norms, policies and laws. However, the knowledge of international politics is not limited to simple facts or straightforward comprehension. Students practice their knowledge of international politics for application and analysis of international phenomenon. The quality knowledge of international politics is utilized for understanding and evaluating major debates of international relations in a critical manner. In doing so, students synthesize concepts and frameworks to create their own thinking of originality with respect to contemporary events at the global level. Moreover, this course will give you a basis for further and independent study in international relations. This class does not assume that you are a political science major, although if you are.

Course Objectives

Students will become aware of what international politics is like with the major concepts and theories of international relations. From power politics to neoliberal institutionalism, a variety of theories of international relations have attempted to explain international phenomenon in their own specific ways. Students will become familiar with the theoretical frameworks and able to evaluate their strengths and weaknesses. Beyond the realm of theories of international relations, students will be exposed to some global issues that have significant impacts on your daily lives as global

citizenry. Such themes as wars, nuclear proliferation, international terrorism, turbulent global economy, global North and global South, environmental degradation and global COVID-19 pandemic will be discussed. The agenda will be accompanied with an introduction of certain international mechanisms that would contribute to constructively dealing with the agenda as potential solutions like international law, international organizations or humanitarian intervention. At last, students will leave this class with more systematic and critical perspectives about international politics on the basis of basic instruments of historical knowledge and theoretical framework beyond a commonsensical and individualistic opinion on global phenomenon.
